




PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE:

MINUTES OF THE NEWTOWN QUILTERS' GUILD MEETING, MAY 15, 2018 – Diana Leslie

The meeting was called to order by President Regina Apuzzo at 7:05 p.m. In the absence of Linda Martin-Mills, Regina introduced our speaker for the evening, Jeannie Campbell, who provided a trunk show of quilts inspired by quilts from magazines she had previously collected, many of which had been embellished and changed substantially from the original quilting articles.

Pat Clayton, 2019 raffle quilt chairperson, talked about the blocks to be constructed for the new raffle quilt. She explained the construction with examples and handed out packets to members, which are to be returned to her by the June meeting.

Because of our move to the Lower Makefield Community Center, we have no place to keep our library, and Regina announced that we will be selling library books starting at the June meeting (yard sale meeting). Books will be sold at \$1, \$3, and \$5. Regina asked for volunteers to help her in moving the books to the guild meeting and helping with the sale.

The June meeting will consist of our "yard sale" for members. Members are to price their own items, with 20% of sales going to the guild (this will be done on an honor basis). If there are any questions, please direct them to Linda Martin-Mills.

Linda is also still looking for an "apprentice" to assist her in planning future programming for 2019, with the thought that this person could then take over the position in our next change of officers in 2019.

The Bucks County Visitor Center (on Street Road) is looking for quilts for their annual show from July 1 through September 3. Complete information and Registration is available at their website, VisitBucksCounty.com/Quiltshow. Registration runs until June 1, with a maximum of 3 quilts per person. Our own Eve Vallorani will be a featured artist with an exhibit of her quilts at the show.

Capital Health Hospital on Scotch Rd/Interstate 95 in New Jersey will host an exhibition of our philanthropy quilt projects curated by Linda Martin-Mills. An opening reception will be held from 6 p.m. – 7:30 p.m. on Thursday, May 31, and all are invited to attend. The reception will feature refreshments and music. The exhibit features quilts made by our guild members for Camp Erin, Quilts for Kids, Quilts of Valor, walker bags for the Birches, and other various individual quilts made with compassion and caring for family members and friends.

Donna Martinez, 2018 raffle quilt chairperson, showed our completed raffle quilt and workers' quilt, and has raffle tickets available for members to pick up. Extra tickets are also available for purchase.

Eve Vallorani, membership chairperson, announced that 41 members and one guest were present. She also talked about a new online group, My Grove, which members can access through her for tutorials and instructors about quilting and other crafts. Contact Eve if you wish to be invited to join this group.

Winner of Treasurer's Trivia was Nancy Steigerwalt, Cathy Stevens won the name tag prize, and Donna Martinez took home the Quilty Prize.

Melissa Curewitz, Philanthropy, announced that she had received 15 quilts for Quilts for Kids, 2 Camp Erin quilts, and 5 walker bags (our total is now 40 bags), and she had two quilts with backings that needed quilting.

Block of the Month show and tell included Pat Clayton (chairperson), Roseanne Friehs, Kim Moll, Lorie Leonardi, Doreen Aiello, Betty Miller, Leona Law, Nancy Yurgovich.

Roseanne Friehs, Hospitality chairperson, announced that June is our birthday month, and she needed members to bring strawberries, shortcake or whipped cream.

Nancy Steigerwalt, chairperson for our quilt challenge, reminded us to keep working on the challenge quilts which are due in October...rules for the challenge (requiring a quilt featuring a medallion) are on the guild website.

We are taking sign-ups for two upcoming workshops, the Mystery Quilt Workshop, on July 17 (the day of our guild meeting), and the Woolly Trees workshop (which is a crafts workshop) in November. Payment is due when signing up. See Linda Martin-Mills for more information.

CHASING THE ELUSIVE SCANT ¼" SEAM ALLOWANCE

I took my first quilting class in 1987 at Bittersweet when it was located off Main Street in Yardley. I hadn't planned to learn to quilt; it happened serendipitously. Let me back up just a bit. I wasn't born into a family of quilters, and we didn't have quilts in our home. I was an adult when I had my first encounter with a "real" quilt, made by one of my former neighbors. I was intrigued by the many different fabric pieces sewn together, which made me wonder: how on earth does one do that? I had to find out. My neighbor had just taken a beginner quilting class at Bittersweet, so I set out to give this quilting thing a try and enrolled in their class.

I learned a lot in that beginner class. I pieced squares, half-square triangles, and curves, and I learned hand appliqué and hand quilting, while making a sampler quilt--everything to get a quilter started on her journey. I, also, learned about fabric, the part about buying it, but I won't go there! What I found most peculiar about sewing the quilt blocks was the odd way of pressing seams and that scant ¼" seam allowance. I remember working really hard to make sure every seam was a scant ¼" and feeling frustrated when things didn't work out. I kept chasing that elusive seam allowance, because failing would break one of the golden rules in quilt making. Plus, I had heard about those legendary quilt police!

It seems that quilters are still chasing that scant ¼" seam. Just check out some of the Facebook groups. There is quite a bit of discussion about what foot works best in getting it right.

Getting it right really does make the difference in your quilts, and it's worth the time it takes to get it right. Some sewing machines are made with the quilter in mind and have special feet, along with ¼" markings on the throat plate. But, my friends, does that mean you will get a "scant" quarter inch? Maybe not! I'd like to share a method that works for me. There are other ways to do this; I just happen to like this one, as it gives me accurately finished blocks.

First, though, let's discuss why it's better to use a "scant" ¼" seam allowance rather than a full ¼". That odd way of pressing seams, which I mentioned above, causes some of the block fabric to be lost in the "turn of the cloth" after you press the block, resulting in blocks that do not measure up to what they should be. Multiply that over the entire quilt . . . well, you get my drift. Some quilters will say, "If I use the full ¼" and keep that consistent when piecing my blocks, shouldn't that be okay?" Yes and no. Yes, if all of the individual blocks in your quilt are the same; for example, all squares or all half-square triangles. Keep in mind, though, if your quilt is made up of all half-square triangles and you've pieced them using a full ¼" seam allowance, the half-square triangle blocks will likely fit together, but the overall size of your quilt may be smaller than what you think, so take that into consideration when cutting any sashing and borders. The answer is "no," if your quilt blocks are a mix of plain and pieced units. For example, if you piece a 3½" square to a 3½" half-square triangle (which you pieced using a full ¼" seam allowance to make the half-square triangle), the half-square triangle will likely be smaller in size than the plain 3½" square.

One way to get the scant ¼" -- You will need a seam guide (Perkins Dry Goods "Perfect Piecing Seam Guide" is what I use) and reusable vinyl "edges" (I use Quilt with Marci Baker).

1. Move your sewing machine needle position to the far right, making sure that you have installed the zigzag throat plate. I prefer to move the needle position, because the ¼" falls into the feed dogs; I get better traction when the full feed dogs are in contact with the fabric.

2. Slide the seam guide underneath the presser foot and carefully lower the needle into the tiny hole located right in the ¼" line on the guide. Lower the presser foot onto the guide to hold it in place. Make sure the guide is straight. Place a vinyl edge strip onto your throat plate, aligning it with the edge of the seam guide. Press into place.
3. Raise the needle from the hole in the seam guide and raise the presser foot.
4. You will now need to test to make sure you have a scant ¼" seam allowance.
 - a. Cut three strips of fabric, each 1½" by 6" long. Cut accurately!
 - b. Sew two strips together, guiding their edges along the vinyl strip. Sew the remaining fabric strip to the two sewn strips.
 - c. Press the unit flat to set the seams, and then press the seams away from the inner strip.
 - d. Measure the sewn unit. It should measure 3½" wide, with each of the two outside strips measuring exactly 1¼" wide, and the center strip measuring exactly 1" wide.
 - e. If the strips are too wide, your seam allowance is too narrow; if your strips are too narrow, your seam allowance is too wide. If one or the other is the case, you will need to repeat the above steps to readjust the vinyl strip. Generally, only a minor readjustment is needed, but do test again to get it right.

It may seem like a lot of work, but I am rewarded when my blocks measure up, and you will be, too.

Many of you will be sewing the blocks that will go into our beautiful 2019 raffle quilt. As you can imagine when many hands make a quilt, it is particularly important for each quilter to sew accurately. Doing so will insure consistency and will make it much easier to put all those blocks together.

My quilter friends, stop chasing the elusive scant ¼" seam allowance. It is within your reach!
